This newsletter provides just a snapshot of racing's community initiatives, so please visit our website and join the newsletter to stay in touch.





New initiatives

There have been many new community engagement, education and accessibility initiatives to celebrate, from the Trevor Hemmings Learn to Ride Summer School to the partnership between The Rio Ferdinand Foundation and The Jockey Club.





Women in Racing with support from the Racing Foundation and Kindred Group have come together to launch racing's first motherhood/ parenthood portal as part of their ongoing project to educate and empower all stakeholders within the horseracing industry.

Employers, employees and those who are self- employed have easy access to information about rights and entitlements regarding pregnancy, maternity, paternity, adoption, shared parental leave, flexible working, self- employment and statutory pay. Find out more **here**.



The Ernest Cooper Macmillan 'Ride of their Lives' charity race at York saw almost £500,000 raised for Macmillan in the 51st running of the raceday. There has been many more fundraising initiatives, including The Britannia Stakes, IJF Charity Race and the Great Racing Welfare Cycle Challenge, which raised £100,000 for Racing Welfare.

This year's Magnolia Cup raised a fantastic £317,351 in support of The Brilliant Breakfast, raising money for young women on The Prince's Trust programmes across the UK.

Yorkshire Beacon

Go Racing in Yorkshire and Racing Together announced in March the Yorkshire Racing Beacon Programme, a year of activity that brings together community-focussed events to unite this racing region as a force for good in local communities.



In celebration of the Platinum

Jubilee, and as part of Racing Together and Go Racing in Yorkshire's Community Beacon, Catterick Racecourse engaged with Risedale School in Hipswell, to find ways to make race days at Catterick more environmentally friendly and sustainable for future generations.

A group of students, between the ages of 11-16, all of whom are Eco Ambassador's for Risedale School, have successfully developed several eco-friendly outcomes including recycling bins; bike racks; increased signage and information to help those walking to the course or arriving by public transport.

In addition, the racecourse has engaged with local primary schools and asked pupils to design the front cover of the race card. The winning design was used on Friday 3 June and the artist invited, along with their family, to join in the action on the day!

Community Day



A record level of participation was achieved for the first Racing Together Community Day since the pandemic, staged on Thursday 5th May.

The annual initiative is an opportunity for a range of racing businesses and charities nationwide to engage with and support their communities through local volunteering activities.

Over 65 organisations from across the sport in locations nationwide embraced the day by giving up their time to help others.

Greatwood



Former racehorse Mahlervous visits Marlborough Care Home

This pilot programme is run by Greatwood in partnership with Racing Together and aims to build the evidence-base for the use of former racehorses to benefit people in community settings, in this case at care homes.

Webinar Series

Racing Together held its first webinar series in winter 2021 designed to start and accelerate conversations on some key community engagement and education topics.

The series comprised of six 45-minute webinars with themes ranging from safer gambling to engaging racing's next generation of fans and future workforce.

Nine additional Racing organisations signed up to the Diversity and Inclusion industry commitment.

This is another progressive step for British racing as more organisations from across the sport come together to illustrate their commitment to diversity and inclusion. The Industry Commitment formalises horseracing's approach to diversity and inclusion, building on the existing activity already taking place.

Black History Month

British racing marked Black History Month for the first time with a video campaign shown widely across racecourses and TV to highlight progress made and as Callum Helliwell says in the campaign 'writing the history books that don't yet exist'.

Racing with Pride

British racing's official LGBT+ network turned two this year.

The network partnered with York Racecourse to hold a Pride Raceday in June, now a finalist in the Racecourse Association Showcase Awards for Diversity & Inclusion.

Targeted inclusion initiatives such as Step On Track, the Riding A Dream Academy, Women in Racing and the Racing Pathway continue to grow and develop across the racing industry.

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A record 800 young people and adults took part in 26 community events during National Racehorse Week in September.

With core funding provided by the Racing Foundation, National Racehorse Week was able to put a significant focus this year on community outreach and engagement. A total of 26 dedicated events took place across the country, supported by Racing Together and Racing to School, with more than 800 people from 11 schools, charities, four urban equestrian centres and community groups getting involved to have their first experience behind the scenes of racing. Where people were not able to attend a yard visit, racehorses were taken to them. Events included:

- Dan Skelton Racing hosted 50 young people from Birmingham's Summerfield Stables, an equestrian charity supporting disadvantaged and disabled young people
- Jo Foster took racehorse Sigurd to a primary and secondary school alongside two care homes in West Yorkshire
- Paul Nicholls OBE hosted a special visit for NHS and Emergency Service workers
- Godolphin hosted Leicester's Urban Equestrian Academy and took a retired racehorse to Newmarket Academy as part of the Newmarket Godolphin Beacon Project
- James Fanshawe and Emma Lavelle hosted children with serious illnesses from the Barrie Well's Trust Box4Kids initiative
- BTRC and Greatwood aftercare centres took racehorse ambassadors to care homes, as part of the growing trend for thoroughbred equine therapy in the community

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These visits inspire, motivate and provide our children with an experience they may never have despite living at the heart of a racing community.

About the Directory

In the summer of 2020, Racing Together, The Racing Foundation and Godolphin came together to conduct a survey of the industry to better understand horseracing's involvement with, and the benefit it brings, to communities and to be able to showcase racing's positive impact.

The Directory maps nationwide activities from over 130 organisations that are harnessing racing's assets to help people develop skills, increase physical activity and create a more diverse and inclusive sport. Activity also includes the immediate responses of racing's businesses and people to reduce the impact of the Coronavirus pandemic on local communities. It is used as a model to support similar international initiatives, for example within Together for Racing International activity.


